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
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


## **Population**

### Overview<sup>1</sup>


Over the past several decades, New Brunswick's youth population has shrunk dramatically. This decline has been the result of decades of high levels of youth outmigration, coupled with fertility rates that, after peaking in the late-1950s, declined significantly throughout the 1960s and 1970s and have remained low since.





As of July 1, 2022, there were an estimated 138,365 New Brunswick residents aged 15 to 29 years. This total was down 30.7% relative to 1982. During this same time, the percentage of the total population that fell into this age category declined from 28.2% to 17.0%.

### Percentage of Population Aged 15 to 29 Years – 2022





However, following thirty-five consecutive years of losses, New Brunswick has seen its population aged 15 to 29 years grow over the past four years. This swing has been due to a number of factors, including:


- Increased immigration levels.
- An increase in the number of international students studying in the province.
- Increased migration from other provinces.
- Decreased out-migration to other provinces.

Going forward, the province's youth population is expected to see slight growth, with potential for greater growth, depending on how long, and to what extent, recent trends persist.

# International Migration Among the Population Aged 15 to 29 – New Brunswick










#### Sub-Provincial<sup>2</sup>

Within New Brunswick, the province's three major urban centres, Fredericton, Moncton, and Saint John, have significantly larger youth populations than the province's less densely populated areas, both in terms of absolutes and on a relative basis. Similar trends are seen across most parts of the country. Despite having a relatively large youth population compared to many other parts of the province, Greater Saint John's youth population was relatively small compared to most comparably sized urban centres across Canada.

The relatively small number of the youth found in more rural parts of the province is the result of years of consistent net losses in interprovincial migration and relatively low levels of immigration. While Fredericton, Moncton and Saint John have historically also seen a significant number of young people move away to other provinces, youth moving to these centres from other parts of the province, along with immigration, have offset these losses.



## **Education<sup>3</sup>**

As of 2022, 94.9% of New Brunswickers aged 20 to 24 had at least a high school diploma<sup>4</sup>. This represented the sixth highest rate for this age range among the provinces.

New Brunswick's high school completion rate among youth compared favourably among many subpopulations. At the time of the 2021 Census, among the Indigenous population aged 20 to 29 living in the province, 77.5% of those living on reserve, and 90.5% of those living off reserve, had completed high school; at a national level these percentages were 55.7% and 80.5% respectively.



Despite having a high proportion of youth who have completed high school, relatively few young New Brunswickers have completed a post-secondary education compared to other parts of the country. As of 2022, 66.7% of New Brunswickers aged 25 to 29 had completed some form of post-secondary education, compared to 73.5% at a national level.

Both in New Brunswick and across Canada, young females were significantly more likely than young males to have completed a post-secondary education. As of 2022, only 57.6% of New Brunswick males aged 25 to 29 years (68.0% nationally) had completed some form of post-secondary education, compared to 76.2% of females in this age range (79.4% nationally).

Relative to a national level, youth in New Brunswick were noticeably less likely to be degree holders, but more likely to hold other types of post-secondary certificates or diplomas.

At the time of the 2021 Census, post-secondary completion rates among the Indigenous youth population in New Brunswick compared favourably to this population at a national level.


Among Indigenous individuals that pursue a postsecondary education, pursuing a university degree was relatively uncommon.

## **Labour Force Characteristics**

### **Overview**<sup>5</sup>

Between January and December 2022, an average of 59.3% of New Brunswickers aged 15 to 24 years were employed, compared to 58.7% at a national level. While historically, New Brunswick's youth employment has generally trailed the national rate, this has not been the case over the past several years.

#### Employment Rate Among Youth Aged 15 to 24



New Brunswick's youth employment rate is helped by the relatively high percentage of youth in the province who are not enrolled in any form of post-secondary education (and thus are more likely to be working). Throughout 2022, only 55% of New Brunswickers aged 15 to 24 years were enrolled in school (81% of those aged 15 to 19 years, and 31% of those aged 20 to 24 years). This represented the lowest percentage among the provinces.



When the population is separated into students and non-students, employment rates among New Brunswick youth compare less favourably to the rest of Canada.


### Students<sup>6</sup>

Throughout 2022, an average of 37.3% of New Brunswick students aged 15 to 24 years were employed at any given time, compared to 43.2% at a national level. It's worth noting that the province's student employment rate increased dramatically in the fall, following the phasing out of the NB-EI Connect Program<sup>7</sup> as a stand-alone program (33.1% employment rate between January to April compared to 41.3% between September to December).


New Brunswick's student employment rate compared especially unfavourably among individuals aged 20 to 24 years.


It's worth noting that, while students in New Brunswick had a relatively low employment rate during the school months, this was not the case during the summer. In 2022, 63.3% of full-time students aged 15 to 24 years in New Brunswick worked during the summer months (May to August), compared to 56.8% nationally.

This rate has been trending upwards in recent years, after having declined for several years following the 2008/2009 recession.

### Non-Students<sup>8</sup>

During the "school months" of 2022 (Jan-Apr, Sep-Dec), an average of 75.2% of non-students aged 15 to 24 years in New Brunswick were employed. This represented the second lowest rate among the provinces.


The employment rate among young males with postsecondary credentials in the province (78.4%) was particularly low, lagging significantly behind both the national employment rate for this group (86.5%) and the employment rate of young females with post-secondary credentials in the province (88.8%).


Employment Rate Among Non-Students Aged 15 to 24 During School Months – 2022


Furthermore, in general, recent university graduates in New Brunswick were more likely to be employed in a position they were overqualified for (in terms of education level), compared to in most other provinces. Throughout the school months of 2022, only 35% of nonstudents aged 15 to 24 with degrees were employed in a managerial role and/or occupations that typically require a degree. At a national level this percentage was 40%. ### NEET Rate<sup>9</sup>

Due to the relatively large size of the province's nonstudent youth population, combined with the relatively low employment rate among this group, New Brunswick consistently has one of the highest proportions of students who were not in employment, education, or training (NEET) in Canada.

### Wages<sup>10</sup>

In general, young workers earn significantly less than older workers. This is primarily a reflection of differences in experience and education levels. According to Statistic Canada's Labour Force Survey, in 2022 the median hourly wage rate among New Brunswick employees aged 15 to 24 years was \$15.00, compared to \$26.10 among employees aged 25 to 54 years. Nationally, the median wage among employees aged 15 to 24 years was \$17.00, compared to \$30.13 among those aged 25 to 54 years.

These low overall figures among young New

Brunswickers (and more generally, young Canadians) were in large part a reflection of the significant portion of the youth population who were working in relatively low-skill, low-paying jobs while still attending school.

Looking at wage rates among youth by educational attainment level, it can be seen that wages were noticeably higher among those with post-secondary credentials, although were still quite low compared to the wage rates of older workers. 
# Median Hourly Wage Among Youth Aged 15 to 24 with a High School Diploma or Less – 2022





# Median Hourly Wage Among Youth Aged 15 to 24 with a University Degree – 2022




### **Employment Insurance<sup>11</sup>**

In November 2022, 3,000 New Brunswickers aged 15 to 24 received employment insurance regular benefits (unadjusted for seasonality). This represented approximately 3.3% of the province's youth population – the third highest proportion among the ten provinces.

Some of the factors contributing to the relatively high percentage of youth that receive employment insurance in New Brunswick include:


- The province's relatively weak economic / labour market conditions
- The seasonal nature of many prominent industries in the province

While the proportion of youth receiving employment insurance benefits in New Brunswick was high relative to most other provinces, it was down significantly compared to previous years.

The recent decrease in young beneficiaries can be primarily attributed to three factors:


- The NB-EI Connect Program being phased out as a stand-alone program<sup>12</sup>
- A number of temporary changes to the EI program expiring on September 25<sup>th</sup>, 2022 (resulting in a greater number of hours of work being required to qualify for benefits)
- The province experiencing lower than usual levels of unemployment (resulting in a greater number of hours of work being required to qualify for benefits)

While the percentage of youth that receive employment insurance benefits is high relative to the national rate across all of New Brunswick, it is particularly high in northern and/or rural parts of the province.

In terms of gender, EI usage was significantly higher among the province's young male population. Of the 3,000 individuals aged 15 to 24 years who received EI regular benefits in November 2022, 1,960 were male, while only 1,040 were female. A similar breakdown was seen across most parts of the country.

### **Appendix: Glossary**

Labour Force: refers to the working age population (15+) that is employed or unemployed.

**Employment:** refers to people who, during the reference week, did any work at all at a job or business; or had a job but were not at work due to factors such as illness, personal, family responsibilities or labour disputes.

Full-Time Employment: refers to people who usually work thirty or more hours per week.

Part-Time Employment: refers to people who usually work less than thirty hours per week.

**Unemployment:** refers to people who during the reference week were without work but had actively looked for work in the past four weeks and were available for work; or were on temporary layoff during the reference week with an expectation of recall and were available for work.

Unemployment Rate: represents the number of unemployed as a percentage of the labour force.

Participation Rate: represents the labour force as a percentage of the working age population.

Employment Rate: represents the employed as a percentage of the working age population.

**Industry/Sector**: The North American Industry Classification System (NAICS) is a comprehensive system encompassing all economic activities. Establishments (businesses) are grouped according to similarity in the production processes used to produce goods and services.
