



Cardiology Technologists

Pathway to Registration for Internationally Educated Professionals (IEP) in New Brunswick

Cardiology Technologists are regulated professionals in New Brunswick (NB). Registration with the [New Brunswick Society of Cardiology Technologists \(NBSCT\)](#)—the regulatory authority—is required to practise and use the titles “cardiology technologist”, “registered cardiology technologist”, “R.C.T.”, or other similar words or abbreviations as outlined in the [New Brunswick Cardiology Technologist Act](#).

Cardiology technologists operate electrocardiogram equipment and use medical imaging technologies to record cardiac activity of patients to aid in the diagnosis, monitoring and treatment of heart disease. They are employed in clinics, hospitals and medical laboratories.¹

STEPS TO REGISTRATION

A pathway for foreign-trained cardiology technology candidates to challenge the national certification exam is no longer offered. Internationally educated professionals must follow the same registration pathway as Canadian-trained candidates as outlined below.

PART 1: COMPETENCY ASSESSMENT

Step 1 – Academic Credentials: The minimum educational requirement to practice in NB is completion of a Canadian Cardiology Technologist education program [accredited by the Canadian Society of Cardiology Technologists \(CSCT\)](#). Not all programs accept international students. The Technologie d'électrophysiologie médicale – cardiologie program at the Collège communautaire du Nouveau-Brunswick (CCNB) is the only CSCT-approved French-language program in Canada, and the only Cardiology Technology program offered in New Brunswick. Tuition and associated fees vary significantly by institution, and candidates should consult each education provider directly for current costs and admission requirements.

Step 2 - Language Proficiency: A language proficiency test is not required for registration with NBSCT and CSCT. However, some Cardiology Technology education programs require proof of language proficiency as part of their admission process.

Step 3 – National Certification Exam: Only graduates of a CSCT-recognized program are eligible to apply for the CSCT national certification exam. Graduates must attempt the exam within the next three consecutive exam sittings following graduation. The exam is virtually proctored, delivered [online](#), and offered twice per year in the Spring and Fall. It is based on the CSCT National Occupational Competency Profile (NOCP). Applicants must complete the [online application](#), submit proof of graduation from a CSCT-recognized program (i.e., pdf copy of diploma, or confirmation of eligibility sent directly from the education institution to CSCT), and pay the exam fee. CSCT will confirm eligibility

by email, and the exam delivery organization will email separate instructions for booking the exam. The pass mark is 65%, and a [practice exam](#) is available. Current fees can be found [here](#).

PART 2: REGISTRATION WITH THE NEW BRUNSWICK REGULATORY BODY

Step 6 – NBSCT Membership: After passing the CSCT national exam, applicants may apply for registration with the NBSCT by requesting an application package. Applicants must complete the application form, submit the required supporting documentation, and pay the annual membership dues. A portion of the membership fee is forwarded to CSCT to cover national membership.

REGISTRATION COSTS AND TIMELINE²

Total registration fees vary depending on the CSCT-approved education program selected. Educational fees range from approximately \$8,500 CAD for domestic students at CCNB to more than \$56,000 CAD for international students at Mohawk College. National certification exam fees and NBSCT/CSCT membership dues add approximately \$1,000 CAD to the total. The overall timeline to registration depends primarily on the length of the education program, which is typically 2 years, and the timing of the national certification exam. Candidates can expect the process to take two to three years in total.

Pre-arrival: Your first step is to complete a CSCT-approved education program which must be completed in Canada.
