Pathway to Registration for Internationally Educated Professionals (IEP) in New Brunswick

Dentists are regulated professionals in New Brunswick (NB). Registration with the [New Brunswick Dental Society \(NBDS\)](#)—the regulatory authority—is required to use the designation “dentist,” “dental surgeon”, “D.D.S.,” “D.M.D.” or other similar designations as outlined in [An Act Respecting The New Brunswick Dental Society](#) and the NBDS bylaws and rules.

Dentists are oral health professionals who provide a wide range of preventive, diagnostic, and surgical services related to the teeth, mouth, jaws, and maxillofacial structures.¹ They work in private practice or may be employed in hospitals, clinics, public health facilities or universities.

PART 1: COMPETENCY ASSESSMENT

Step 1 - Language Proficiency: The NBDS does not require a language proficiency test for registration. However, strong working proficiency in English or French² is necessary to complete the certification process and to provide effective patient care. Language testing may be required for immigration purposes or for admission to academic upgrading programs.

Step 2 – Academic Credential Assessment: The minimum educational requirement to practice in New Brunswick is completion of a Doctor of Dental Surgery (DDS) / Doctor of Dental Medicine (DMD) program accredited by the [Commission on Dental Accreditation of Canada \(CDAC\)](#). The CDAC has [reciprocal agreements with accrediting bodies](#) in the United States, Australia, New Zealand, and Ireland, and [individual agreements](#) with Yeditepe University (Turkey) and King Abdulaziz University (Saudi Arabia). Graduates of non-accredited programs must demonstrate equivalency through the [National Dental Examining Board of Canada \(NDEB\)](#).

Candidates from non-accredited programs must first create an [NDEBConnect account](#) and submit all [required documents](#), including documents sent directly by their university and current regulatory body. Once deemed eligible, candidates may pursue one of two pathways.

Option 1 –[NDEB Equivalency Process](#): Candidates must sequentially register for, pay the required fees, and pass three examinations: the [Assessment of Fundamental Knowledge \(AFK\)](#), the [Assessment of Clinical Judgement \(ACJ\)](#), and the [National Dental Examination of Clinical Competence \(NDECC\)](#). The AFK and ACJ are multiple-choice exams offered twice per year through select [Prometric](#) test sites in Canada and internationally. The NDECC is a one-and-a-half-day clinical assessment offered four times per year in Ottawa, Ontario. Current fees can be found [here](#).

Option 2 – [Accredited Qualifying/Degree Completion Program](#): Several accredited Canadian universities offer advance placement dental programs for internationally educated dentists. Candidates are typically placed in the second or third year of the program and graduate with a DDS or DMD degree. Third party entry requirements and fees will apply.

Step 3 – Examining Board Certification: After academic equivalency has been established, candidates must register for the [Virtual OSCE](#) (Objective Structured Clinical Examination) through their [NDEBConnect account](#). This six-hour computer-based examination is offered [multiple times per year](#) at Prometric test centres in Canada and the United States. Successful candidates receive an NDEB certificate. PART 2: REGISTRATION WITH THE NEW BRUNSWICK REGULATORY BODY

Step 4 – Licensure: After obtaining NDEB certification, candidates must apply to the NBDS by completing the [online application](#), submitting the [required documentation](#), and paying the annual [dues](#).

REGISTRATION COSTS AND TIMELINE³

Total fees to be licensed by NBDS through the NDEB Equivalency Process are approximately \$15,850 CAD. Credential assessment may take up to 10 weeks after all required documents are received. The full process may take 2 years or longer depending upon examination scheduling. Fees for an accredited Qualifying / Degree Completion Program vary significantly by university—expect in the order of \$250,000 CAD. Timelines for these programs often exceed three years.

Pre-arrival: You may begin the academic credential assessment process with NDEB and possibly complete the AFK and ACJ exams before arriving in Canada.
