Pathway to Registration for Internationally Educated Professionals (IEP) in New Brunswick

Optometrists are regulated professionals in New Brunswick (NB). Registration with the [New Brunswick Association of Optometrists \(NBAO\)](#)—the regulatory authority—is required to practise and use the title “Doctor” or the abbreviation “Dr.”, the initials “O.D.”, or the designation “Certified Therapeutic Optometrist” as outlined in the New Brunswick [Optometry Act](#) and [bylaws](#).

Optometrists examine eyes to assess and diagnose ocular diseases and disorders. They prescribe and fit eyeglasses and contact lenses and recommend treatments such as exercises to correct vision problems or ocular disorders. Certified Therapeutic Optometrists may prescribe, administer and use pharmaceutical agents applicable to eye-related conditions. They work in private practice, clinics, community health centres, rehabilitation centres, the optical industry, government, and universities.¹

STEPS TO REGISTRATION

PART 1: COMPETENCY ASSESSMENT

Before applying to NBAO, candidates completing the registration process in English must first complete the [Federation of Optometric Regulatory Authorities of Canada \(FORAC\)](#) credential assessment process. Candidates completing in French must apply through the [Ordre des optométristes du Québec \(OOQ\)](#) and complete their process before applying to transfer to NB. This factsheet details the FORAC pathway.

Step 1 - Language Proficiency: Applicants whose optometry program was completed in English are not required to complete a language proficiency test. All others must submit language test results that meet [FORAC benchmarks](#).

Step 2 – Academic Credential Assessment: The minimum educational requirement to practice in NB is completion of an Optometry Program accredited by the [Accreditation Council on Optometric Education \(ACOE\)](#). All other applicants must demonstrate equivalence by completing [the FORAC application \(Form 5\)](#) with required documentation², including language test results if applicable, and a WES ICAP report. Step 3 – Internationally Graduated Optometrist Evaluating Examination (IGOEE): After successful credential assessment, applicants must pass the IGOEE administered by the [Touchstone Institute](#). This four-part exam is offered once or twice per year, based on demand, and includes two remote virtual components, and two in-person clinical components completed in Toronto. Applicants who pass may proceed to the National OEBC exam (Step 5), while those who do not meet the minimum standard must complete additional training (Step 4). Current fees can be found [here](#).

Step 4 – Advanced Standing Optometry Preparatory Program (ASOPP): The [University of Waterloo ASOPP](#) begins with a spring term session, after which candidates enter the third year of the four-year Doctor of Optometry program. A limited number of seats are available each year ([six at time of writing](#)). Current fees can be found [here](#).

Step 5 – Canadian Board Exam: The [Optometry Examining Board of Canada \(OEBC\)](#) examination is a mandatory entry to practice requirement for all Optometrists in Canada. It is offered in the spring and fall and consists of two components: a one-day written exam completed remotely, and an Objective Structured Clinical Examination (OSCE) held in Hamilton, Waterloo, or Montreal. PART 2: REGISTRATION WITH THE NEW BRUNSWICK REGULATORY BODY

Step 6 – Licensure: To apply for licensure with NBO, applicants must request an application package by emailing nbao@nbao.ca. Completed applications with the supporting documentation detailed in [Section 7\(2\) of the bylaws](#), as well as the application fee and the therapeutic pharmaceutical agent (TPA) licence fee, if applicable, must be submitted. The jurisprudence exam, written in NBO offices in Fredericton, must be completed before a licence is issued. Current fees can be found [here](#).

REGISTRATION COSTS AND TIMELINE³

Total fees to become a licenced Optometrist vary by individual circumstances. Applicants who do not require ASOPP can expect fees of approximately \$14,190 CAD, while those requiring ASOPP can expect fees of approximately \$234,600 CAD. Timelines typically range from one to two years without ASOPP and three to four years with ASOPP and may vary depending on application timing relative to IGOEE and OEBC examination schedules.

Pre-arrival: You may complete the FORAC credential assessment process before arriving in Canada.
